**COMMUNION DISTRIBUTION CHANGE**

Beginning with the first weekend in July, we are implementing a change in the way communion is distributed at weekend Masses in order to accommodate the increased number of communicants during the summer months. The celebrant, deacon and two Eucharistic Ministers with hosts will be stationed in front of the altar on the lowest step, (and at the 930 Mass, a cup bearer will be at each end of the front step). This allows communicants using the center aisle to maintain a smooth flow to receive the host from one of the four EM's with hosts, (and then at the 930 Mass, either receive from the cup or return to the pew). Communicants from the side aisles will continue to receive as usual in either transept. Communion will be brought to those seated in the back who cannot come forward to receive at the altar.

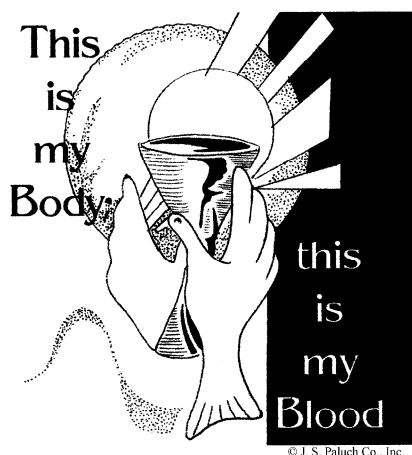
**TODAY'S READINGS**

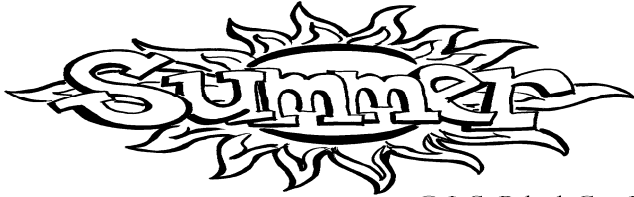

## THE MULTIPLICATION PROCESS

The catechist asked her young students to bring to their next religious education class something from home that symbolized their family's faith. One student brought a Bible; someone else, a crucifix; and still another, a rosary. But one little girl brought what may have been the most meaningful expression of all: her mother's casserole dish.

Many sacred vessels and objects are used in our liturgical celebrations: patens which hold the consecrated bread of the Eucharist; chalices which hold the transformed wine; linens to cover the altar; holy water and incense to give us a "sense" of the holy.

But there are many other ordinary, common things we use every day that we may never think of as sacred -- yet they can be instruments and tools of God's compassion. For example:

the crock pot in which you make supper for a family in mourning . . .

the towel you use to wipe the brow of a dying parent or to cool the forehead of a sick child . . .

the soup kettle and ladle that are used to feed the poor and homeless. Every act of selfless generosity, every random act of kindness extended, every moment given to the needs of another is the incense of prayer rising to God's dwelling place.

When shared, the food Jesus gives multiplies -- just as love and forgiveness, generosity and kindness do.

Jesus' teaching nourishes. Whatever little bit we give is transformed through Christ's gracious hospitality as nourishment in abundance for all.

The feeding of the 5,000 is the only miracle of Jesus recorded in all four Gospels. Clearly, the early Christian community took this story to be a precursor to the Eucharist. In every version of the story, Jesus responds to the disciples' concern for the crowds by challenging them to give whatever they can -- if only a few fish and some scraps of bread. Through these small offerings, Jesus works the wonder of forever connecting compassion and generosity with the Sacrament of himself. He is the bread and wine blessed and broken for our sake -- the ultimate gift. But there is a string attached: the gift must be shared.

In receiving Eucharist, we must become Eucharist for others. We must come to recognize Christ in each other and in all the ordinary moments of our lives. We must be willing to become the limitless, complete love of Jesus for all.
