SUMMER MASS SCHEDULE

Our Summer Mass Schedule with Sunday Masses at 8, 9:30 and 11 begins the first weekend of July and continues through Labor Day Weekend. The Vigil Mass is at 5 p.m. year-round.

COMMUNION DISTRIBUTION CHANGE

Beginning with the first weekend in July, we are implementing a change in the way communion is distributed at weekend Masses in order to accommodate the increased number of communicants during the summer months. The celebrant, deacon and two Eucharistic Ministers with hosts will be stationed in front of the altar on the lowest step, (and at the 930 Mass, a cup bearer will be at each end of the front step). This allows communicants using the center aisle to maintain a smooth flow to receive the host from one of the four EM's with hosts, (and then at the 930 Mass, either receive from the cup or return to the pew). Communicants from the side aisles will continue to receive as usual in either transept. Communion will be brought to those seated in the back who cannot come forward to receive at the altar.

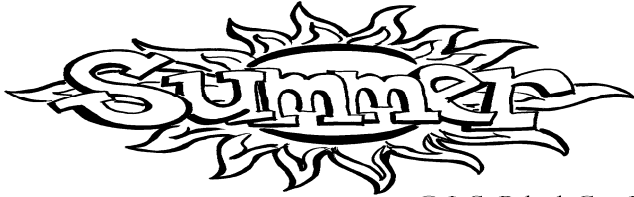

“WHO DO YOU SAY THAT I AM?”

Visitors to Arlington National Cemetery know they have found Section 60 when they spot the fresh flowers, bright-eyed teddy bears, and other touching mementoes among the military grave sites. Section 60, the subject of a TV documentary, is the resting place for America’s war dead from Iraq and Afghanistan. The camera crew spent four months at the cemetery as witnesses to the grieving family members whose losses were softened by the bonds they made with each other. One photographer found himself “dripping tears on his camera lens.” A mother explained that talking about her dead son helped to “keep his memory alive.” A widow said that she hoped the film would help other bereaved family members “understand that you can somehow make it through this.” For their part, the film makers wanted viewers to remember “that there are people crying in Section 60.”

Long before Jesus went to his death, he knew where his actions, his message, his refusal to be anything other than who he was would ultimately lead. He knew that his death would be painful, not only for himself, but for his family and friends. In order to prepare them for what was to come, Jesus asked them to reflect on who he was and who they, as his followers, would have to be. In today’s gospel, he asks the same of us: Who do you say that I am? How will others know that you are my disciples?

As we ponder these questions, we are brought face-to-face with who we are. Are we willing to be one with him -- to share as fully as our limited human nature allows -- in compassionate service and unconditional love? The camera crew went to Section 60 to give witness to the suffering survivors and to remind us that “people are crying there.” We show our unity as Christians by going to where people are suffering in mind, body, or spirit and caring for them. As mystic Simone Weil put it, “The capacity to give one’s attention to a sufferer is a very rare and difficult thing. It is a miracle.”

When Jesus asks us, “Who do you say that I am?” we might respond with one word: love. And what does love look like? St. Augustine says, “Love has the hands to help . . . The feet to hasten to the poor and needy . . . Their eyes to see misery . . . The ears to hear the sighs and sorrows of all. That is what love looks like.” Who are we and where do we stand in the light of such love?
