HABITAT FOR HUMANITY

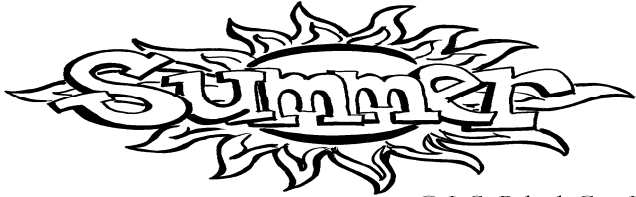

GREATNESS OF HEART - A SIGN OF DISCIPLESHIP

John Gagnon is a U.S. postal worker in Lewiston, Maine. Not too long ago, John was travelling in Vietnam on vacation. Looking for souvenirs in a small gift shop in Ho Chi Minh City, John saw among the T-shirts and trinkets a small basket of miscellaneous items. What he found while rummaging through the basket made him stop in his tracks: amid the trinkets were 20 dog tags of American servicemen, ten of them in good enough condition to read. "These need to go back to America," he said to himself. "They don't belong in a basket of 'junk'." He couldn't get the \$25 they were asking for the tags out of his pocket fast enough.

Now John is on a mission to return the tags to the families of those servicemen. So far he has found eight of the ten families: in Tennessee, Iowa, Arizona, and Florida. A few weeks ago, he tracked down the family of Army Sgt. George Palermo in Plainfield, MA. Palermo was killed in Vietnam in June 1969. He was 25. After contacting the family, John drove three hours from his home in Maine to Massachusetts. With roses and the tags in a small jewelry box, he presented them to Palermo's mother, aunt, and niece.

The niece, who was only a toddler when her uncle was killed, said this generous act meant more to the family than John would ever know and that the greatness of his heart would not be forgotten.

With three tags left to identify and deliver, John says simply, "These men were my brothers - my countrymen -- I'm doing this as a way of saying thank you!"

John Gagnon's mission that began in a Vietnamese shop mirrors the mission of the 72 in Luke's Gospel -- the same mission each of us is called by Christ to embrace. The Spirit sends everyone of us forth to proclaim God's kingdom of brotherhood and sisterhood and to bring the peace of the Risen One to all we meet. It is this attitude of servanthood and humility that enables us to realize the opportunities in our daily lives -- the simple acts of kindness and generosity --- that establish true community.

As we celebrate this 4th of July holiday, may we remember that each small act of love or reconciliation within our own families and communities is never lost. These are the building blocks -- the foundation -- of Christ's kingdom. The very integrity of our nation and our world depends upon our personal and communal response to the call to be agents of compassion and justice to this needy world.
