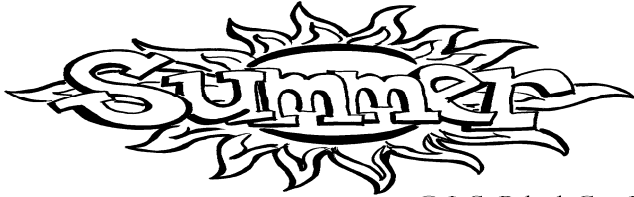

MOVEMENT OF A COMPASSIONATE HEART

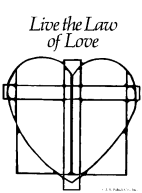
Edward Seliner in *Sunday by Sunday*, a commentary on the Sunday scripture readings writes: “The Samaritan hero of Sunday’s gospel is a marginal person. The word ‘margin’ comes from the Latin word ‘margo’, which means a ‘border’, an ‘edge’, a ‘frontier.’ A ruling or dominant race, group, society, or church marginalizes individuals or groups by not recognizing, valuing, or including them in decisions that affect the entire body.”

According to Seliner, a marginalized person is often caught in cultural conflicts or institutional transitions. . . They are partly ‘in’ and partly ‘out’. They live on the edge with divided loyalties. People at the center often misunderstand them and resent them.

Marginalized people can seem threatening to people in the majority. They are often labeled as ‘pushy’, ‘grabby’, or aggressive. They are often seen as objects of scorn, rejection, humiliation and blame.

The Samaritan in this week’s gospel was a marginalized person -- a member of a heretical group detested by Jews and Pagans alike. For Jesus to hold up a Samaritan as a truly compassionate and wise person was to send a cultural “shock-wave” to the ears of his listeners. His audience must have thought: “How could anyone make a Samaritan the hero of a story -- a person obviously so unworthy and unacceptable?”

It seems that the Samaritan was the one who, perhaps from the depths of his own woundedness and suffering, had learned to be attentive to someone else’s need. He, not the priest or the Levite, was moved to do what could be done for a fellow sufferer.



Compassion is a movement of the heart. It includes sensitivity to what is weak and wounded as well as the courage to allow oneself to be affected by another’s life and pain. Who can take away suffering without entering it? How can we help heal someone else’s wounds if we have no understanding of what it means to be wounded?

Jesus calls us to be compassionate -- to find ways of making our own gifts and limitations, our own joyful and painful experiences available as sources of healing, wisdom, and leadership.

May our attitude in living out our Christian faith be less an adherence to law and precepts, and more a profound gratitude for all we have received through Christ. If we are ever mindful of how much we have been given, we will more readily share with those around us.
